SPIN is co-sponsored by the Department of Education and the Disability & Communication Access Board. Services include a phone line for information, referral and support, a quarterly newsletter, an annual conference and community workshops. SPIN is guided by an Advisory Committee made up of parents, teachers and people with disabilities.

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When Hawaii's public school students pick up their pencils, laptops and tablets in early August, their learning will be tied to new education standards, the Common Core State Standards or CCSS. These standards were originally developed in 2010 and have been adopted by 45 states, as well as Guam, American Samoa and the Northern Mariana Islands.

CCSS grew out of a partnership between State Superintendents of Education and Governors across the country who were concerned that too many students were not prepared for college or 21st Century careers when they graduated from high school.

Unlike many other educational reform efforts, CCSS were developed with ALL types of learners in mind, including students with disabilities. Special educators were part of the teams that developed and tested the standards.

The CCSS Initiative also issued a guide to states called "Application to Students with Disabilities." In it they stressed that in order for students with disabilities to meet CCSS and show their knowledge

and skills, their instruction must include the following supports and accommodations:

- ★ related services and supports to meet the unique needs of the student and enable access to the general education curriculum;
- ★ an IEP which includes annual goals aligned with grade-level standards; and
- ★ teachers who are prepared and qualified to deliver high-quality, evidence-based, individualized instruction and support services.



Basic Facts about the CCSS

- ✓ They are for all students in Kindergarten through 12th grade.
- ✓ They cover English Language Arts (reading, writing, speaking and listening, language, media and technology) and Mathematics.
- ✓ They allow students to build from year to year on their prior understanding.
- ✓ They define what students should understand and be able to do at each grade level; they do not tell teachers how to teach.

Benefits of CCSS

Many educators and parents are hopeful that these new standards will prepare our children for more successful life experiences, even though they have not been fully tested over time. Some of the key benefits of CCSS are listed below:

Benefits of Common Core State Standards (CCSS)

- C** - Critical thinking skills & problem solving abilities improve
- C** - Collectively shared tests and materials save money for schools
- S** - Set expectations in 45 states protect students from losing ground when moving
- S** - Success in work and higher education due to knowledge/skills

Seven Steps to a Standards-based IEP

- 1) Look at CCSS for the grade in which the student is enrolled (or would be enrolled based on age).
- 2) Look at data to see where the student is performing in relation to the standards.
- 3) Identify the student's present levels of academic & functional performance.
- 4) Develop measurable annual goals and objectives aligned with the standards.
- 5) Identify specially designed instruction, instructional & testing accommodations, assistive technology devices & services needed to progress toward the standards.
- 6) Determine the most appropriate option for statewide assessments (with or without accommodations, regular assessment or alternate assessment).
- 7) Measure & report on the student's progress throughout the year and adjust supports as needed.

Measuring Progress

By the new 2014-15 school year, most students with disabilities will be tested along with their non-disabled peers using a new Smarter Balance Assessment Consortium (SBAC) statewide assessment. An Alternate Assessment based on the new standards will be available for the small group of students whose cognitive disability prevents them from taking the SBAC test. For this school year, a "bridge" assessment has been developed, containing items from the old HSA that are relevant to the new standards. Both the SBAC and the bridge assessments are taken on-line and offer a number of accessible features as well as accommodations for students with individualized needs.

Helping Your Child Succeed

With the introduction of CCSS, students will be learning in new ways. In English Language Arts, some of the changes include: 1) reading more non-fiction texts that provide facts and background knowledge (like newsletter articles), 2) reading more challenging materials and referring back to what was read to answer questions, and 3) learning a more complex vocabulary. For Mathematics, some major changes are: 1) learning a more focused set of major math concepts and skills, 2) applying these concepts and skills to solve real world problems.

As we all know, our children do better in school when we are involved in their education. Below are some suggestions on how you can make a positive difference in your child's ability to reach and exceed the new standards.

Educate Yourself. Look through the common core standards to get a feel for what your child will be learning as he moves through school. Check out some of the other websites in the next column to pick up additional information. Consider attending workshops (like those at the SPIN Conference)!

Be an Active IEP Team Member. Help link IEP goals to grade-level standards. Discuss possible accommodations and modifications to coursework. Does your child need access to assistive technology in order to benefit from his or her education? Decide whether your child will need testing accommodations. If so, be sure he or she has time to practice with them prior to testing.

Talk with Your Child's Teachers. Set up a method for communication, so that you can receive important notices and share information. Ask for ideas on what you can do at home. If your child fails to make adequate progress on IEP goals, find out what additional strategies and resources can be provided.

Monitor Homework. The National PTA recommends that parents try and sit down with their child at least once a week for 15-30 minutes while he or she works on homework. This keeps you informed about what your child is working on and gives you a way to know when your child needs help with specific topics.
